

PLAYOFFS

WAGRAM vs. CALIFORNIA

WAW 000 000 000 - 0 5 0 CAC 320 000 00x - 5 10 0

The Coolers came out determined in game 1. Having not beaten Roger Clemens all year, the California bats were warm to the occasion as they jumped all over the Wagram ace. The Coolers sent 9 men to the plate in the 1st and pushed across 3 big runs. Clemens was gone after 2 innings thanks to the big bat of Mark McGwire. After 1 out, Tony Fernandez singled, was sacrificed to 2nd by Rance Mulliniks, the McGwire did what he does best, sending an off-speed pitch deep to left. The Coolers would get no more, but that was plenty as Ron "Clemens" Robinson shut the Warhawks out on just five hits. Robinson went the distance striking out 9 and walking only 2.

WAW 400 100 021 - 8 10 2 CAC 510 000 000 - 6 9 1

Game 2 featured early offensive explosions by both teams, then great pitching and finally a Wagram rally that sent these teams packing, tied 1-1. The Warhawks took out their 1st game frustrations by blasting Cooler starter Rick Rhoden for 2 homers and 4 first inning runs. Unfortunately for Wagram starter John Farrell, the Cooler bats were just as hot. A 3-run blast by none other than Mark McGwire, a Dave Parker double, and a throwing error by Farrell left the Coolers with a 5-4 lead and the momentum after 1 inning. added another run in the second and Rhoden, after that rocky first, was starting to settle down. Wagram nicked Rhoden for one more in the 4th, making it 6-5, but that's the way it stayed until that fateful 8th inning. California, clinging to the one run lead, finally relieved Rhoden, bringing in Andy Hawkins to pitch the 8th, before Bob Walk would come on to gain the save in the 9th. That's the way manager White would have liked it, but Wagram had another idea as Tim Teufel, who already had 4 hits in the series, sent a 2 out offering into the CF bleachers for a 7-6 Wagram lead. tying run got on due to confusion in the outfield as everybody converged on Julio Franco's pop fly, but nobody caught it. Wagram added an unearned run in the 9th and California's rally attempts were feeble at best, as all they could muster was a 1 out base on balls in the 8th.

CAC 310 000 002 1 - 7 10 0 WAW 010 005 000 0 - 6 12 1

The Coolers jumped on Rick Sutcliffe early in game 3 as Vince Coleman led off the first with a single and McGwire followed with a 2 out double. Dave Parker then hit a 2-run shot for a 3-0 lead. Each team added a single tally i the 2nd and CAC went into the bottom of the 6th with a 4-1 lead and seemed to be cruising to a victory, but Wagram woke up and pounded in 5 runs in the inning. Andre Dawson led off with a double and Leon Durham singled him in. After a wild pitch, Mike LaValliere singled Durham to 3rd and Tracy Jones then singled to score run #2. With 2 on and none out, Tony Bernazard hit a 3-run shot to put WAW up 6-4. Wagram seemed to have the game in the bag as Dave Righetti came on to retire the first 2 in the ninth. Then disaster struck. Tommy Herr walked and Jose Canseco came through with a pinch-hit single, 2 on - 2 Coleman then stepped up and smacked one off the LF fence scoring both runs and tying the game. Then with 2 out in the 10th, Parker hit his second dinger of the game, a solo shot for the win. Sutcliffe struck out 10 in 7 innings for the losers.

CAC 000 200 000 - 2 6 2 WAW 002 000 41x - 7 9 0

Game 4 saw Roger Clemens looking to avenge his first game shelling. Wagram drew first blood in the 3rd as LaValliere led off with a single and Curt Young, CAC's last minute starter, muffed Clemens' sac bunt attempt. Tracy Jones then came through again doubling in both runs and the Warhawks led 2-0. California evened it up in the 4th on Ernie Whitt's 2 out, 2-run blast, but that was all the Coolers could muster against Clemens as he went the distance allowing 6 hits and fanning 9. Wagram, though went on to score 4 runs in the 7th as CAC played sloppy defense, an error and a passed ball went along with 4 WAW singles and a double in the inning. Henry Cotto added a solo pinch-hit HR in the 8th and Wagram evened the series at two with a 7-2 win.

CAC 300 000 203 - 8 14 0 WAW 000 000 011 - 2 10 1

Ron Robinson allowed 3 hits in 6 innings of shutout ball for

his 2nd win in the 5 games played. In the first, Julio Franco booted Canseco's grounder to load the bases. McGwire then walks in Coleman, Lake sac flies in Herr and Ken Williams hits an rbi single for 3 unearned runs. The Coolers added a pair in the 7th when Williams singled and Luis Salazar homered for a 5-0 advantage. In the bottom half, the Warhawks managed a bases loaded one out situation, but failed to score. The Coolers tallied 3 more in the 9th and barely missed 4 more as the inning ended on a DF to RF with the bases loaded.

WAW 200 523 000 - 12 13 1 CAC 302 303 20x - 13 17 0

California came home to the friendly confines of Wrigley Field with a 3 games to 2 edge. The fans definitely got their money's worth in this wild one as the home team rallied to win it and advance to the World Series. Luis Polonia led off the game with a double, advanced to 3b on a passed ball and scored on a Bobby Bonilla SF. Dawson then hit a solo shot for a 2-0 lead. It didn't last long, as Coleman singled, stole second, advanced to 3b on a fly ball and scored on Mulliniks' double. One out later, Parker hit it for the distance. In the 3rd, Fernandez doubled and Mulliniks homered for a 5-2 CAC lead. The top of the 4th saw for the distance. Andre Dawson triple, Teufel walk, Durham sac fly in Dawson, LaValliere double in Teufel, and Ward hit a loop single. Mark Eichorn then doubled in LaValliere followed by Polonia's 2-rbi single. In CAC's half, Williams, Herr and Horton single, Coleman reaches on a FC and steals 2b, Fernandez beats Franco's throw for an rbi infield single, and Coleman scores on Mulliniks grounder, 8-7 California. In the WAW 5th, Dawson gets hit by Horton and Teufel clears the ivy, 9-In the 6th, Polonia singles, Horton balks, Bonilla doubles home Luis, and Dawson greets Hawkins with a blast to CF, 12-8 Wagram. CAC comes back in the bottom as Fernandez and Mulliniks single; McGwire reaches on Bonilla's error to load the bases. Parker's FC scores Fernandez, Whitt doubles in Mulliniks, Williams is hit by Righetti and Herr walks in a run. The 7th saw Coleman single, advance to second on Fernandez's bunt, score on Mulliniks' double. Rance then scored the winning run on Parker's single. Hawkins shut down the Wagram attack with one hit over the last 3.1 for the win. Dave Leiper was on the hill to finish the game and take the loss for Wagram.

WEST COAST vs. DELAWARE

WCL 221 000 330 - 11 21 1 DLD 000 120 000 - 3 13 0

The Labelers brought their offensive guns to bear on Jim Clancy in game 1, as the Labelers bombed the Destroyers 11-3. Clancy gave up 13 hits in the first 6.1 innings and gave up 6 runs to take the loss. Clancy's poor performance wasn't aided by Don Gordon (2 runs in 0.2 innings) or by Scott Bailes (gave up consecutive solo home runs to Wade Boggs, Dwight Evans and Chris James - the first 3 batters he faced). West Coast pounded out 21 hits and Boggs' run-scoring double in the first inning was the game winner. Mike Dunne lasted well, giving up 13 hits over 8.1 innings and striking out 6. He got the win. Evans went 3 for 4 with a double and a home run; Ozzie Guillen went 3 for 5 with a double and a triple and scored 3 runs.

WCL 000 003 300 - 6 6 1 DLD 110 030 11x - 7 12 2

Poor fielding and inconsistent relief nearly lost game 2 for the Destroyers. After 5 innings, Delaware held a comfortable 5-0 lead and Bill Long had thrown perfect ball (15 up, 15 down). Three consecutive singles, followed consecutive errors by Paul Molitor and Long, allowed 3 runs to score, cutting the Destroyers' lead to 2. David Cone relieved Long in the 7th, but did no better, giving up 3 runs on 3 hits and giving the Labelers a 6-5 lead. Delaware tied it up off Dave Martinez's triple in the 7th and scored the winner in the 8th off Goose Gossage, as Mike Schmidt singled home Jim Rice. Jose Nunez got the win, striking out 2 in 1 inning, and Steve Bedrosian saved the game, striking out 1. B.J. Surhoff went 2 for 4 with 2 RBI for the Labelers; Martinez was a perfect 3 for 3 with a double and a triple; and Mike Schmidt was 4 for 5 with a homerun and 3 RBI for the Destroyers.

DLD 000 501 000 - 6 10 0 WCL 000 100 300 - 4 15 0

With two outs in the top of the 4th inning the Delaware

Destroyers showed why they led the league in hitting. They connected on four straight singles and a double to score 5 runs. The Labelers made a game of it in the bottom of the 7th cutting the lead to two. For the game, Bob Forsch got the win and also drove in 2 runs with a 2-3 night at the plate. Dave LaPoint started and took the loss for West Coast. B.J. Surhoff led all hitters with a perfect 5-5 night as the Labelers lost despite out-hitting the Destroyers 15-10.

DLD 000 001 000 - 1 5 0 WCL 105 101 01x - 9 12 1

Tom Candiotti shut down the potent Delaware attack, going the distance with a 5 hitter. The Labelers again ripped ace Jim Clancy with the big blow a 5 run third inning. Barry Bonds and Wade Boggs each collected 2 hits to pace the Labelers to victory. The Destroyers biggest threat came in the 6th when they got 3 of their hits, but left two men stranded.

DLD 000 000 300 2 - 5 14 1 WCL 010 000 110 0 - 3 14 0

The Labelers, desperately needing another home win before going back to Fenway, thought they got a big break in the Ron Guidry injured himself and had to leave second inning. the game. Manny Trillo managed to drive in Surhoff and it was 1-0 WCL. Starter Rich Dotson cruised along until the top of the 7th when Harold Baines singled in Jim Rice. followed by driving in Milt Thompson and Paul Molitor's single scored Baines. Greg Gross hit a pinch-hit SF to score Dave Concepcion in the bottom half. In the 8th, Wade Boggs hit a high fly to Thompson who lost it in the lights allowing it to fall in for a double. Surhoff stepped up and drove in Boggs to tie the game with 2 outs. Greg Brock followed with a single which Dave Martinez bobbled, putting runners on 2nd Concepcion draws a walk to load the bases, but Lee Smith fans Trillo to end the inning. In the 10th, Martinez hit a leadoff single and went to 2b on a sacrifice. Bo Diaz followed with an infield single, putting runners on the Donnie Hill squeezed in Martinez and Thompson corners. singled home Diaz for some insurance. Chuck Crim too the loss, Don Gordon, the 8th Destroyer pitcher got the win.

WCL 200 000 001 - 3 8 2 DLD 000 003 40x - 7 13 0

With their backs to the wall, West Coast jumped out with 3 straight singles in the first inning to take a 2-0 lead. In the 4th, DLD starting hurler Bill Long got hurt and have to leave, shades of Guidry in game 5. Three rbi singles by Schmidt, Mattingly and Molitor put DLD ahead to stay in the 6th. Hill hit a PH triple that drove in Spike Owen and Bo Diaz for insurance runs in the 7th. David Cone pitched through the 6th inning and collected the win. Labeler ace Mike Dunne gave up 3 unearned runs but was tagged with the loss.

WORLD SERIES

CALIFORNIA vs. DELAWARE

CAC - 8 DLD - 11

Pitching took a back seat in game 1, as the hitters strutted their stuff. Ernie Whitt homered twice and home run champ Mark McGwire also homered, but the Destroyers singled and doubled their way home on the way to an 11-8 victory. Milt Thompson went 3 for 3 with 2 doubles, Harold Baines went 3 for 4 with 2 doubles and Dave Martinez notched 4 singles. These three combined for 8 rbi. Jim Clancy went 4.2 innings to get the win. Ron Robinson took the loss for the Coolers. There was a frightening moment in the 8th when Kenny Williams lined a single off relief ace Steve Bedrosian. Fortunately, Bedrosian was only shaken up. He went on to finish the game.

CAC - 1 DLD - 8

The left-handed aces battled in game 2. Ron Guidry and Curt Young went nose-to-nose and Guidry won in an 8-1 romp. Spike Owen doubled home two runs to get the game-winner. Dave Martinez hit a two-run homer and Jim Rice added a solo shot for some added power. Guidry went 7 innings and struck out 4 to get the win. Young allowed 5 runs in 2.1 innings and got the loss. Luis Salazar tripled home California's only run.

DLD 001 000 110 - 3 7 1 CAC 203 100 01x - 7 9 0

A two out error by Bobby Meacham set the table for Ernie Whitt's 2 rbi double in the bottom of the first. It was Whitt again in the bottom of the third, this time smacking a Bob Forsch pitch for a 3 run homer. Rick Rhoden cruised through 7.2 for the win. Forsch was pinned with the loss.

DLD 003 012 000 - 6 11 1 CAC 204 010 10x - 8 11 0

Rance Mulliniks hit a 2 run shot in the bottom of the first to spot Rick Aguilera a 2-0 lead. Delaware came back in the

3rd with rbi singles by Thompson and Baines, and went ahead on Mike Schmidt's sacrifice fly. The Destroyer lead vanished in the bottom half as Whitt followed McGwire's rbi single with a 3 run homerun that sent DLD starter Bill Long to the showers. The Destroyers rallied for 2 runs in the 6th inning but fell short as the Cooler bull pen allowed only one hit over the last 3.2 innings.

DLD 142 000 010 - 8 12 0 CAC 120 000 000 - 3 10 0

Bo Diaz hit a 3 run dinger in a 4 run Delaware second inning that put this one on ice and gave DLD a 3 games to 2 lead going back to Fenway. After a rough playoff, Jim Clancy collected his second victory of the World Series, scattering 9 hits over 7.1 innings. Thompson and Don Mattingly each had 3 hits for the winners. Ron Robinson took the loss for the Coolers.

CAC 000 100 102 - 4 12 1 DLD 200 304 02x - 11 15 1

Four consecutive singles by Schmidt, Mattingly, Paul Molitor and Dave Martinez brought home 2 Destroyer runs and gave Bob Forsch the lead he would never relinquish. Mike Schmidt drove in two in the 4th and another in the 6th for a DLD romp. Forsch went the distance and Rhoden was tagged with the loss. Schmidt finished the day 3-5 with 4 rbi.

The first ever SWBA World Series is won by the Delaware Destroyers 4 games to 2. Delaware finished with a combined record of 103-71. California finished 101-73. Congratulations to both Scott Kitchen and Robert White.

DELAWARE DESTROYERS

Well, with the inaugural SWBA season over, I can truly say that I'm very pleased with the performance of the Destroyers. Capturing the American Conference crown was truly a coup, as I had figured this team to contend for maybe fifth or sixth place overall out of the twelve teams. Offensive production was definitely the key (Schmidt hit .317 with 50 HR's and 143 RBI, Molitor hit .327 with 22 HR, Mattingly hit .315 and drove in 100 with 30 HR), while the pitching was nearly forgettable (total team ERA of 4.60). Ron Guidry was our ace, going 12-3 with lots of offense behind him, while our number one starter, Jim Clancy, went 14-11 with an ERA better than Guidry's but not enough offense when it counted.

The early draft choices performed well as a whole. The hitters averaged around .310. Five hit more than 20 HR. Three had more than 100 RBI. Five had 30+ doubles. The pitchers did better than average (ERA of 4.42), but my feeling is that it was lackluster at best. Bedrosian did well, but sometimes lost it in the clutch. Lee Smith did better, but threw wildly several times too many. Guidry was a big surprise, and the acquisition of David Cone could do wonders for the staff next year.

Some highlights and lowlights: Schmidt's 3-HR games (two of them); the 7-run comeback against Florida to win, 10-9; my 5-13 record against Pennsylvania (doing better against them could have made the race a runaway); the disastrous losing streak during the middle of the season; the almost-miraculous comeback (winning 22 of 28 during one stretch); Clancy's one-hitter against Jersey Shore; Molitor stealing home. All these made it a memorable season.

Looking forward to next year, there are some definite holes that need filling. The biggest is behind the plate where Bo and Mike Diaz can't combine to give me a whole catcher. Another is the infield, where I need to find a full-time second or third baseman. Molitor can fill either role, but not both. Trading Mike Schmidt and acquiring Roberto Alomar or Vance Law in the draft is a priority. and middle relief pitching is also a necessity, and I'm losing a lot of innings with pitchers retiring or staying in the minors. I have three platoonable shortstops, but a permanent fixture would be nice. Thompson, Martinez and Baines are a good outfield with Rice and Wilson as backups. Mattingly remains at first base. At this moment, the starting five look like Cone, Clancy, Bailes, Forsch and Some trading will be necessary, I'm sure, Schmidt's name stands out. I'm sure of his ability to come back and judging by his offensive production, he can complete a team.

Consistency, that was the key, as the Coolers claimed the National Division title of the SouthWest Baseball Association, finishing with a 95-67 record and home field advantage in the semi-finals.

California took control in early May, by sweeping 5 games at Mesa and returning home to take 4 of 5 from Tempe. The West Coast Labelers stayed in close pursuit, even briefly leading in early August, before finally melting in the heat down the stretch. A crucial late September clash between the Division pace-setters sealed the teams' fates. The fired up Coolers traveled down I-5 to the L.A. based Labelers' Coliseum and swept 4 games in resounding fashion, by outscoring the reeling Labelers 23-5.

The Coolers had modest win streaks of 6, 7 and 8 games, while never losing more than 4 in a row. Floundering early in the season on the road, California put it all together, going 23-11 after July 25th to finish with a .531 road pct.

Co-captains Mark McGwire and Tony Fernandez shared MVP honors for the offensive minded Coolers. McGwire led the team in RBI-156, Homers-56 and GW-19. Fernandez led in Avg-.317, Hits-198, Doubles-41 and Triples-10. Other statistical leaders included Vince Coleman with 118 SB and 123 Runs; pitchers Curt Young and Rick Rhoden with 16 and 15 Wins respectively.

The Coolers concluded their season by beating the Wagram Warhawks in the semi-final series 4-2, then losing in 6 games to the American Division Champ Delaware Destroyers in the SWBA World Series. Although it's tough to repeat, the 1989 Coolers should again contend with the big bats of McGwire and Canseco and an improved pitching staff to lead the way.

WAGRAM WARHAWKS

The Warhawks' season got off to a good start even before the season began by being awarded the first ever SWBA draft pick. Roger Clemens became the first pick and went 21-8 with a 2.83 ERA and 250 strikeouts, which was good enough to be wagram's MVP. It's too bad Wagram's second pick wasn't as successful. Rick Sutcliffe was an unexplainable disaster going 13-14 with an ERA of 4.49. Wagram came up with a steal by acquiring Andre Dawson with the 48th pick, although he didn't have his MVP type year, he did have 36 dingers and 107 RBI. The Warhawks also came up with a few dark horses in the draft by taking Tim Teufel in round 7 (27 HR's), Bobby Bonilla in round 9 (36 2B's, 16 HR's and 100 RBI) and the biggest surprise of all, Luis Polonia who had 12 triples, 49 steals, 9 GW and hit .307.

Wagram made no trades during the year, although they did try to dump Gary Ward, but could find no takers. This turned out to be an advantage since Ward hit .274 with 14 HR's and 51 RBI. He is still being offered if anyone is interested.

The definite highlight of the season was making the playoffs, although they lost 4-2 to the Coolers. The season could have been a little more exciting if Delaware hadn't run off with the division. Wagram was also involved in a triple play, a big triple play, as there were no outs and bases loaded as Wagram was able to escape without allowing a run.

Wagram began the season in a mediocre fashion, barely playing .500 in round one, but the Warhawks caught fire in round two, winning 15 of 22 and in the 5th round going 19-13. Only one round, round 4, was played under .500, but it was only 13-14. Wagram's season was fairly consistent, as they worked their way up to 20 games over .500 by season's end. Although the team MVP was awarded to Clemens, Tony Bernazard made major contributions filling in for Tim Teufel at second base. Bernazard pitched in with a .263 average, 13 round trippers, 52 RBI and 7 GW. The real MVP would have been the second base duo of Teufel and Bernazard who between the two of them hit .274, had 40 HR's, 128 RBI and 17 GW.

Even though Wagram had a good initial year, sophomore season does not look as bright. Wagram will be losing Bernazard and Hulett, dumping Trout, Durham, Tolleson, Bando, Keedy and Roenicke. The Warhawks are in dire need of a shortstop, first baseman, center fielder and are willing to trade anybody. Although nobody is untouchable, Clemens will cost an arm and a leg. The 1989 Warhawk offense is looking weak, but the pitching appears to be promising. Wagram is looking forward to the new season with hopes of once again making the playoffs!

The inaugural SWBA 1988 regular season has drawn to a close. It looks as if the West Coast Labelers will hang on to secure a spot in the SWBA playoffs, finishing with an 86-76 won-loss record.

The West Coast Labelers compiled a 28-21 record after 2 rounds due to a total team effort.

The biggest surprises were 16th plus round draft choices Dave LaPoint (8-4) and Claudell Washington (.276), both of whom will see much action in 1989.

The biggest disappointments were Barry Bonds (#8 pick, .221 avg., 10 HR) and Mark Davis (#7 pick, 7-8, 4 saves, 4.05 ERA). Needless to say, based on the completed 1988 Major League Baseball season, both players have much to look forward to in the '89 SWBA season.

The Labelers will have many areas to improve upon in order to contend next season. As a result, the Labelers will be very interested in off season trade talks regarding any players on the WCL roster.

first post-season began SWBA Pennsylvania Sluggers. Pennsylvania managed to finish with a record above .500, but it wasn't quite enough to make the playoffs. It appears the Sluggers fell just short in many areas during the league's inaugural season.

A good example of this occurred on August 8 in a game at Gulf Coast. The game was both the highlight and the lowlight of the season for the Sluggers, but most of all it was an indication of just how the season went for Pennsylvania. On that day, Pennsylvania pitcher Mike Bielecki tossed nine innings of no-hit ball. But after the final out of the ninth inning, the game went to the 10th as a scoreless tie.

In the 10th, Bielecki, who had allowed only three walks and one hit batsman through the first nine innings, gave up a double to Tony Gwynn to ruin the no-hit bid. Bielecki was then replaced by reliever Jeff Robinson, who promptly yielded a single to Willie McGee, a base-loading walk to Terry Pendleton and a squeeze bunt that won the game. Bielecki's linescore read 9 IP, 1 H, 1 R, 1 ER, 3 BB, 3 K and one LOSS.

After much thought, I could not decide on one player as Pennsylvania's MVP. So, I decided to have the award shared by center fielder Lloyd Moseby and third baseman Howard Johnson. Moseby led the team in hits (187), walks (80), stolen bases (56) and shared the team lead in doubles (30)while batting .295. Johnson led the team in home runs (33), runs scored (105), rbi (102) and narrowly missed the 30-30 club with 29 stolen bases. Both players, however, had their drawbacks. Moseby struck out a team-high 118 times and Johnson batted only .244 and committed 17 errors.

Errors were a big problem as the team committed 137 miscues. In addition to Johnson's 17, Kurt Stillwell had 19 errors. The team could live with Cecil Cooper's 15 if it wasn't for his paltry .204 batting average. Benito Santiago had an amazing 26 errors. It often looked as if he was playing a game of catch with Moseby when opponents tried to steal second base.

Looking back on the draft, I can't complain about my first nine draft picks. Despite the errors, Santiago at times played like he was worth the 6th pick in the draft. Dave Winfield looks like a steal in the 9th round as does Rafael Palmeiro in the 11th. But this is one guy who isn't happy with the Palmeiro trade to Texas. There's a big difference between hitting in Wrigley and hitting Arlington.

Prior to opening day, I made predictions for each conference. As a prognosticator, I did as poorly as I did as a manager. In the National Conference, I saw it: 1.Arizona 2. Tempe 3. California 4. Tasmania 5. Mesa 6. West Coast. In the American: 1. Wagram 2. Jersey 3. Delaware 4. Pennsylvania 5. Gulf Coast 6.Florida. The results were no conference champions and only one of the four playoff teams. I felt Arizona had the best team despite it's lack of right-handed pitching. West Coast was the team I underestimated the most. I can't figure out Jersey Shore. There is an awful lot of talent in that pitching staff.

As for next year, a thin group of starting pitchers must be improved. A deal for a starter or infielder would help.

The strategy going into draft day was to draft an irregular ballpark (Yankee Stadium), grab some lefty starters to force opponents to use right handed hitters who would hit it into the desert in left-center and center field. As the draft started, there were some mighty bats available that made GM Joe Hornback water at the mouth. Before the draft was over, the Arrows had claimed the likes of George Bell, Jack Clark, Eric Davis, Andy Van Slyke and Dale Sveum. Looking at that lineup on paper put fear into the other SWBA managers, but that was pretty much the extent of it. The pitching staff was lefty, actually too much lefty, with Jim Gott as the closer.

Well, the best made plans of mice and men didn't take place. While structuring the arms to take advantage of the vast waste land in the LF-CF area, Bell, Clark and Davis would also be driving the ball in that direction. It wasn't long until other teams stopped fearing the Arrows as a competitor for the playoffs.

The offense responded by scoring the 3rd highest number of runs. Only the champion Destroyers and runner up Coolers scored more. This despite an extremely slow start by Jack Clark who finally came around to have a decent season. Eric Davis was a major disappointment hitting .232 despite 31 HR's and 99 runs. Without those two, the rest of the pitching staff had a 3.98 ERA.

Looking to the future. It's nice to have as a core of the team Andy Van Slyke, Fred McGriff (acquired in trade of Eric Davis), Kelly Gruber, Jose Lind (acquired in Davis trade), Bruce Hurst, Joe Magrane (acquired in George Bell trade), Juan Nieves and Rob Murphy. The management strictly intends to develop a team that will better take advantage of Yankee Stadium. Also, look for more right handed pitchers to appear in the rotation.

All in all, the first SWBA season was a tremendous amount of fun. It was truly a pleasure to have an explosive team. Watching George Bell's MVP type performance was fantastic, and also personal favorite Andy Van Slyke provided excitement. Here's looking to next year.

Higuera whiffed 218 to lead the staff. Dan Plesac was the leader out of the bullpen with 27 of the staff's 37 saves, a 7-6 record and ERA of 2.07.

Looking ahead to 1989, most teams in the SWBA will have improved pitching staffs and the Tides are included in that Returning to the starting staff will be Higuera along with Ron Darling, Kevin Gross and Ed Whitson. Competing with them will be converted reliever John Smiley and lefty Bob Ojeda who saw limited action for Jersey in 1988. The bullpen include lefties Plesac and Jesse Orosco and right handers Lance McCullers and Mike Jackson. Jersey Shore will be looking for catching help for Jody Davis, who will be available for about half the season. The team will be looking for some help at first base and third base as injuries and poor performance will affect Mike Pagliarulo and Tides' GM Joe Zinkowicz is looking forward to Greg Walker. the draft and entertaining trade talk with other managers in Management would also like to congratulate and thank SWBA commissioner Joe Hornback for the super job he did at the helm of the first season. Thanks to the other managers for being prompt with instructions and results, especially Delaware manager Scott Kitchen who helped me convert to computer play (even though his team dominated the Tides, whether it was the board game of the Epson).
